

Through our nationwide scholarship grants and support for the Alternative Learning System program of the Department of Education, we strive to break the cycle of poverty and inequality.





A Milestone in Inclusive Education

The Department of Education has urged CLFI to assist them in their ALS program most especially with learning centers located in remote communities where the ALS program is much needed.

In 2023, CLFI supported 40 new ALS community learning centers, bringing the total number of ALS centers supported across the country to 155. This opened the doors to quality education for over 57,000 ALS learners since 2014, dismantling barriers that previously limited access to schooling.







With these milestones, the Department of Education has consistently recognized CLFI as one of its valuable partners.

In the Philippines, prioritizing information and communication technology equipment is important. Since ALS caters to the marginalized sectors in mostly rural communities, which may lack access to traditional educational resources, ICT equipment such as laptops, tablets, printers, projectors, and WiFi routers with load cards can greatly enhance the learning experience. These ICT tools and equipment provide interactive learning platforms, access to digital resources, and opportunities for remote instruction.

Choices And Chances For A Better Life

I halted my schooling during my third year of high school. I got distracted and unfocused because I enjoyed earning money as a street vendor in Divisoria.

Twenty years passed, and the persistent reminder from my children nudged me back to the classroom. Whenever I urged them to prioritize their studies, it would boomerang on me: "What about you, Mama? You didn't finish your education."

Motivated to set a good example for my children, I returned to school. I wanted them to witness firsthand my unwavering commitment to education, and to set an example of my determination and persistence.

I envisioned them proudly declaring, 'Look at my mom, pursuing her studies even at this age.'

Previously, I had resigned to the notion that this was the extent of my educational journey. Hope seemed elusive until I discovered the Department of Education's ALS program. It offered me opportunities and choices to pursue my dreams—for myself and my family.

I've decided to pursue my college education. My sights are set on a future where I can work abroad, earning substantial income to support my family, particularly my children, who rely solely on me.

I extend my deepest gratitude to the people behind CLFI for their unwavering support of the ALS program, which has been instrumental in my journey towards educational fulfillment.

A Different Journey For Success

I got pregnant at the age of 15, so I had to stop going to school when I was in 3rd year high school.

It was very hard, you know, from getting pregnant to taking care of a baby. Then, it felt like I lost all interest in studying.

After a year, I decided to go back to school. Someone suggested, 'Try doing ALS.' So, I joined ALS around 2018. It helped me a lot. I made it to college and graduated.

If I hadn't studied ALS, I probably would have lost hope of ever going back to school. What really inspired me was the thought that if I don't study, what will I provide for my family? We all know that education is an important requirement for finding work.

So, I went to Dubai after I graduated. Now I'm being trained at my first corporate job.

I am grateful because even though my life's journey was different from others', I still got the chance to reach their level — I got to study and find work too.

I'm thankful to CLFI. If it weren't for them, I wouldn't be here. I believe they can help many more people like me.



Hope for Julia and Her Daughter

I was only 15 years old when I got pregnant. I had to stop going to school because of this. The father of my daughter was also a teenager like me. He was not making enough money to support me and our daughter.

One day, my daughter got sick and I needed money to buy her medicine. I asked my parents for financial help but they didn't mind me.

Desperate to make money, I collected bets for 'basketball ending.' Unfortunately, there was a police raid on the site. The police accused me of also drug trafficking because I was with a drug peddler that day. But I swear I had nothing to do with that. I was just at the wrong place at the wrong time.

Right now, I am temporarily detained at Bahay Pag-asa (correctional facility for minors) while my case is being tried. It's good that someone here is teaching ALS, and I was told that Cebuana supports it. Since I am enrolled in ALS here, I became more motivated when I learned that I can earn a high school diploma if I pass the test. It has given me new hope.

I am determined to pursue my education even after I get out of Bahay Pag-asa. I want to graduate.

They say that because I am still young, I still have hope. When I leave here, I will study hard and raise my child well so she will have a better future than mine.

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I come from a big family, the second among six siblings. My father used to work in the Middle East. But when the pandemic hit, he lost his job and had to come home.

I used to be an honor student, but because of financial problems, I started to struggle. Sometimes I had to go to other houses to borrow a laptop or to connect to Wi-Fi. Or I would even go to our church to connect and attend online classes so I would not fall behind. It was the first time my grades dropped so low. So I started wondering about my future – should I continue studying or start working to support my family financially?

But I never lost the desire to pursue my education and didn't allow this challenge to stop me.

The scholarship and allowance I got from CLFI were a huge help. They gave me hope to graduate. It brought me and my family so much joy because I was the first child to finish college among my siblings. They see me as someone who will lift us out of poverty.

I wholeheartedly thank everyone at Cebuana Lhuillier Foundation for giving me hope and the opportunity to change my life and help my family.


Since 2016, Cebuana Lhuillier Foundation, Inc. (CLFI) has initiated several public services and advocacies promoting Disaster Resilience starting with the Disaster Resilience Forum. They have been mounting the forum to provide a platform for industry experts to teach innovative ways to strengthen communities against calamities and disasters.

In 2017, CLFI continued to disseminate information not only on disaster risk financing but also on policies and programs for preparing MSMEs (micro, small, and medium enterprises), agriculture, and high-risk communities can be prepared against calamities.

CLFI decided to broaden the scope of the Disaster Resilience Forum and bring it to those who are truly affected – the barangays.

In 2018, the forum focused on encouraging everyone to participate – from individual Filipinos to families and communities – in the Disaster Resilience program.

Amidst the pandemic in August 2020, CLFI established the Barangay Resilience Exchange (BRX), with the assistance of the Ashoka Foundation, the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), and the Office of Civil Defense (OCD).



Presented in three parts—Ready to Initiate, Ready to Collaborate, and Ready to Innovate—the disaster resilience forum is an attempt to emphasize the importance of preparedness and provide means on how Filipinos can rebuild their lives after a disaster.

BRX provided a platform for barangay leaders, along with government agencies, the private sector, and civil society organizations, where they can exchange knowledge, innovation, and solutions to be prepared and resilient in facing and recovering from calamities.

On October 13, 2022, in conjunction with the celebration of the International Day for Disaster Risk Reduction by the United Nations General Assembly, over 50,000 delegates participated in the BRX Digital Conference, which was streamed live on Facebook and

YouTube. The theme of the two-day online conference was "Ang Handang Barangay, Mahusay."

BRX 2022 was once again supported by the Department of the Interior and Local Government (DILG), the Office of Civil Defense (OCD), and additionally, by the Department of Science and Technology (DOST).

BRX 2023 Conference:

Leaders Unveil Life-Saving Video Series on Disaster Preparedness

Cebuana Lhuillier Foundation Inc. (CLFI) premiered the *Cebuana Alerto* video series at the Barangay Resilience Exchange Digital Conference 2023, led by Senator Loren Legarda, Department of Interior and Local Government Secretary Benjamin Abalos, Jr., and Department of Science and Technology Secretary Renato Solidum, Jr.

The theme of BRX 2023 digital conference was, "Maging Alerto! Maghanda at Magtulungan para sa Kaligtasan."

The event highlighted the importance of disaster preparedness and collaboration, with CLFI emphasizing its commitment to empowering communities. Over the years, BRX has grown into a national conference, supported by various stakeholders.

Coinciding with BRX 2023, CLFI launched the first three episodes of *Cebuana Alerto*, hosted by Dr. Ted Esguerra, featuring practical rescue demonstrations for emergencies during typhoons, floods, earthquakes, and accidents.

This digital program was developed in collaboration with Dr. Esguerra, an operational medicine instructor at the International Disaster Response Network. Through *Cebuana Alerto*, he shares his expertise and experience in rescue operations.

Heads of government departments and agencies, as well as private organizations related to disaster resilience joined the three-hour conference that was streamed live on Facebook.

A Disaster Preparedness Video Series

Bawat Pilipino, Dapat Alerto!

ALERTO is a disaster preparedness video series that aims to raise awareness and equip grassroots communities with knowledge and life-saving skills. It showcases actual rescue demonstrations for emergencies occurring during typhoons, floods, earthquakes, and accidents. The first three episodes were launched during the BRX Barangay Resilience Exchange Digital Conference last September 2023.

This video series is hosted by Dr. Ted Esguerra, an operational medicine instructor at the International Disaster Response Network, who shares his experience and expertise in the field of rescue operation.

Uploaded for broadcast on Facebook and YouTube, Alerto is produced by CLFI. In addition to its social media distribution, the management of PJ Lhuillier Group of Companies promotes this campaign and has made it mandatory for all their 10,000 employees to watch Alerto as part of their disaster resilience training.

Episode 2: EARTHQUAKE PREPAREDNESS AND RESPONSE

This episode highlights the importance of knowledge and skills regarding earthquake preparedness and response. Located along the Ring of Fire or the Circum-Pacific Belt, almost the entire Philippine archipelago experiences frequent seismic and volcanic activities that place hundreds of communities at risk every year. "The Big One" — the massive earthquakes that can happen



anytime soon in Metro Manila, Cebu, and Leyte — remains a threat to millions of Filipinos.

Dr. Ted Esguerra explains and demonstrates what to do before, during, and after an earthquake. This includes life-saving information and skills that anyone can learn during an unexpected earthquake.

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Cebuana Lhuillier Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation), a non-stock, non-profit organization, which comprise the statements of assets, liabilities and fund balance as at December 31, 2023 and 2022, and the statements of revenue and expenses, statements of changes in fund balance and statements of cash flows for the years ended, and notes to financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Foundation as at December 31, 2023 and 2022, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the years ended in accordance with Philippine Financial Reporting Standard for Small Entities (PFRS for SE).

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audits in accordance with Philippine Standards on Auditing (PSA). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements* section of our report. We are independent of the Foundation in accordance with the Code of Ethics for Professional Accountants in the Philippines (Code of Ethics) together with the ethical requirements that are relevant to our audits of the financial statements in the Philippines, and we have fulfilled our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements and the Code of Ethics. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with PFRS for SE, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Foundation's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Foundation or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.



Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Foundation's financial reporting process.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue auditors' report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with PSA will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in aggregate, these could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with PSA, we exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. We also:

 to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain

- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.


